**Please describe the objectives of a veterinarian meeting this shortage situation as well as being located in the community, area, state/insular area, or position requested above (limit your response to 200 words or less).**

The objectives of the veterinarian filling the shortage situation in this area would be to assist in maintaining and improving animal welfare; maintaining the health of animals that contribute to an abundant, wholesome food supply; and maintaining and improving the veterinarian to food animal ratio. Further objectives would be to provide continuity for existing clientele and to fulfill the obligations of regulatory medicine for the State & Federal Governments. In addition, the state hopes to mitigate the vulnerability to emerging animal diseases by maintaining an appropriate veterinarian to animal ratio in this area.

**Please describe the activities of a veterinarian meeting this shortage situation and being located in the community, area, state/insular area, or position requested above (limit your response to 200 words or less).**

This veterinarian would become a skilled veterinary practitioner as well as increase the consulting time with clients. This veterinarian would also assist in improving the response time to clients and animal emergencies in a practice area with a high concentration of animals. The activities of this veterinarian will assist in developing and maintaining a community of sustainable food animal producers. In addition, an existing practice in this area services two sale barns on a weekly basis and often called to assist with another sale barn in the surrounding area. Opportunities also exist to offer specialized services to clients such as artificial insemination and heifer development. This existing practice currently services 50% large animals, but with the additional veterinary staff could service 80% large animals.

**Please describe any past efforts to recruit and retain a veterinarian in the shortage situation identified above (limit your response to 100 words or less).**

Previous efforts to recruit recent graduates to join the practice as an associate were successful but the ability to retain these veterinarians in this shortage situation were unsuccessful due to concerns that the income potential for the food animal practitioners in this area is not competitive with other professional endeavors, particularly when considering the amount of educational debt that needs to be serviced. Opportunities are possible for associates to buy into an existing practice once some experience and clientele has been established.

**Please describe the risk of this veterinarian position not being secured or retained. Include the risk(s) to the production of a safe and wholesome food supply and to animal, human, and environmental health not only in the community but in the region, state/insular area, nation, and/or international community (limit your response to 250 words or less).**

With several doctors in Southeast Nebraska at or approaching retirement, it is believed many communities will experience a void in veterinary services. Therefore, without this veterinary position being secured, the area will continue to be underserved. This poor food animal to veterinarian ratio could adversely affect the welfare of food animals and negatively impact our safe, abundant food supply. Without adequate veterinarian expertise in this area, the state would lose the necessary skills that: educate current and future producers on how to manage their animals; give producers the knowledge that allows them to better care for their livestock; helps ensure a rapid response in the event of an animal disease situation; and continues to ensure safe and affordable animal products that feed the world population.
