Please describe the objectives of a veterinarian meeting this shortage situation as well as being located in the community, area, state/insular area, or position requested above (limit your response to 200 words or less).

This area was designated as a shortage situation in 2010. We are resubmitting it for consideration, and this application contains the same material as 2010, except we have changed the requested type of designation from a Type 1 (80 percent) to a Type 2 (at least 30 percent) to reflect concerns that a new veterinarian in the area may have to receive work in addition to food animal in order to support the practice as he/she gets established. Once established, we expect the primary focus would be in beef and swine animals and servicing auction markets, but at this time we estimate an awardee could expect 40 percent of his/her time to be spent on food animal work.

The objectives of the veterinarian filling the shortage situation would be to assist in maintaining and improving animal welfare; maintaining the health of animals that contribute to an abundant, wholesome food supply; and maintaining and improving the veterinarian to food animal ratio. Further objectives would be to provide continuity for existing clientele and to fulfill the obligations of regulatory medicine for State and Federal Governments. In addition, the state hopes to mitigate vulnerability to emerging animal diseases by maintaining an appropriate veterinarian to animal ratio.

Please describe the activities of a veterinarian meeting this shortage situation and being located in the community, area, state/insular area, or position requested above (limit your response to 200 words or less).

The activities of the veterinarian filling the shortage situation in this area would be to become a skilled veterinary practitioner as well as increase the consulting time with clients. This veterinarian would also assist in improving the response time to a animal emergencies in this large practice area and become proficient in regulatory medicine. The activities of this veterinarian will assist in developing and maintaining a community of sustainable food animal producers.

Please describe any past efforts to recruit and retain a veterinarian in the shortage situation identified above (limit your response to 100 words or less).

These are very remote Nebraska counties. For example, in Sioux County the only town listed on the map is Harrison, with a population of 279. Attempts to bring in veterinarians have not been fruitful. Producers in these counties are getting some service by established practices in surrounding counties, but the travel time is extensive, particularly for Sioux County livestock owners. The possibility exists for established practices to open a satellite office that would primarily service Dawes and Sioux Counties.

Please describe the risk of this veterinarian position not being secured or retained. Include the risk(s) to the production of a safe and wholesome food supply and to animal, human, and environmental health not only in the community but in the region, state/insular area, nation, and/or international community (limit your response to 250 words or less).

There are over 200,000 head of food animals in this practice area and from our understanding no veterinarian in Sioux County. Due to the age of the practitioners in the area, retirements are possible. Considering the concentration of food animals in these counties, there is a great deal of opportunity to service clientele. Without this veterinarian position being secured the area will continue to be underserved. This poor food animal to veterinarian ratio could adversely affect the welfare of food animals and negatively impact our safe, abundant food supply. Without adequate veterinarian expertise in this area, the state would lose the necessary skills that: educate current and future producers on how to manage their animals; give producers the knowledge that allows them to better care for their livestock; helps ensure a rapid response in the event of an animal disease situation; and continues to ensure safe and affordable animal products that feed the world population.
